<p>Reading: It is really important that your child continues to read as regularly as possible. <p>Writing: This week, I would like you to write an acrostic poem. An acrostic poem is where the first letter of each line spells out a word or phrase. See the websites for some examples. Rules to follow:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Decide on a topic/theme • Write your word vertically in capitals • Think of words or phrases that describe your theme • Link these words or phrases to each line, starting with the first letter of your chosen word. <p>Acrostic poems don't need to rhyme and don't need to follow a rhythm. <p>Maths: Your child has a login for TT Rock Stars where they can continue to practice their times tables.</p> <p>White Rose Maths offers daily lessons and activities to try.</p> <p>The Maths Factor, by Carol Vorderman, offers daily videos, lessons and exercises matched to the National Curriculum.</p> <p>We have been working hard to learn and recall number facts in school. Please continue to practice:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • number bonds to and within 20 • doubles and halves to 20 • counting to 100 and back from 0 or any other given number • counting in multiples of 2, 3, 5 and 10. <p>At home this week, I would like you to look at measurement. In Year 2, children learn to choose and use appropriate standard units to estimate and measure:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • length/height in any direction (cm/m) • mass (kg/g) • temperature (°C) • capacity (l/ml) <p>This is done to the nearest unit using rulers, scales, thermometers and other measuring vessels. Please use what you have around the house and discuss what measuring instrument you would use and what unit of measure it would be.
