

<p><b>Reading:</b> It is really important that your child continues to read as regularly as possible. <p><b>Writing:</b> This week, I would like you to write a fictional (made up) story. You can be as creative and imaginative as you like! Please remember to include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Characters (good and bad)</li> <li>• A setting</li> <li>• A title</li> <li>• An introduction/build up</li> <li>• A problem</li> <li>• A resolution</li> <li>• An ending</li> </ul> <p>If you click on the links to the right, there is a poster showing details on how to write a good story and a planning template where you can consider each of these areas before you begin writing. <p>Think about stories you know (The Three Little Pigs, Jack and the Beanstalk etc.). Remember to use this story language to help you. There is an example text to look at (The Gingerbread Man) where you can think about the different features of story writing. <u>Always remember to proof check any writing you do. Use capital letters and punctuation, check it makes sense and look for spelling errors.</u></p>	
<p><b>Spelling:</b> Spelling Shed is updated every Thursday so please practice these regularly. <p><b>Maths:</b> Your child has a login for TT Rock Stars where they can continue to practice their times tables.</p> <p>White Rose Maths offers daily lessons and activities to try.</p> <p>The Maths Factor, by Carol Vorderman, offers daily videos, lessons and exercises matched to the National Curriculum.</p> <p>We have been working hard to learn and recall number facts in school. Please continue to practice:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• number bonds to and within 20</li> <li>• doubles and halves to 20</li> <li>• counting to 100 and back from 0 or any other given number</li> <li>• counting in multiples of 2, 3, 5 and 10.</li> </ul> <p>At home this week, I would like you to look at fractions. In Year 2, children learn to recognise, name and write fractions for:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <math>\frac{1}{2}</math> (one half)</li> <li>• <math>\frac{1}{4}</math> (one quarter)</li> <li>• <math>\frac{1}{3}</math> (one third)</li> <li>• <math>\frac{2}{4}</math> (two quarters)</li> <li>• <math>\frac{3}{4}</math> (three quarters)</li> </ul> <p>of a length, shape, set of objects or quantity. <p>You could find fractions of objects around your house. For example, find <math>\frac{1}{4}</math> of 12 pencils by sharing them into 4 equal groups, find <math>\frac{1}{3}</math> of 15 chips by sharing them into 3 equal groups etc. You could cut out some shapes and cut/fold these into different fractions - remember they must be equal sizes.</p>
